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Guidelines in respect of Institutions need to put in place to accommodate students, who do not fulfill the mandatory attendance norms

1. Parental Involvement

- Communication with Parents: regular communication with parents, either through meetings, phone calls, what's app masseges, letters, or emails, to inform them about their child's attendance.
- Parental Acknowledgement: Institutions may require parents to submit a consent letter or attend a meeting, ensuring they are aware of attendance issues and support measures.

2. Monitoring and Early Intervention

- Regular Monitoring: Tracking attendance closely and providing periodic warnings or updates to students and parents.
- Mentoring Systems: The role of mentoring in monitoring attendance and providing guidance to students to improve their attendance and academic performance.

3. Counseling and Support

- Counseling: Counseling to students facing attendance issues and addressing the root causes.
- Mentorship and Academic Guidance: Personalized support through mentors/ teachers or academic advisors can help students manage their time better and improve attendance. I

4. Additional Classes and Support

- Extra Classes and Remedial Sessions: Offering extra classes, either on weekends or during breaks, to help students
- Remedial Measures: Remedial classes or personalized tutoring are offered to students who fall behind due to low attendance, ensuring they can still succeed academically.

5. Clear Policies and Communication

- Clear Communication of Policies: Institutions should clearly communicate their attendance policies at the commencement of the academic year; emphasize the importance of regular attendance.
- Early Warning and Alerts: Sending warnings when students fall below the required attendance threshold can help in early intervention.
